The time has flown by, and I'd like to thank each of you for all you've done to make a difference for the kids, your club, and your community. As I've traveled around the District visiting clubs, I've heard about the amazing projects that you've been doing for the kids in your communities, I know that the future is bright for those kids and for the success of Optimism in Illinois!

The 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter Convention in East Peoria, August 12-13, saw a small but enthusiastic group of Optimists come together for the final installment of the "Living the Creed" program. These kits included pencils eraser, glue stick, "Smarties" candy – to boost their smart brain power, post-it-notes and a personalized card from an Illinois District Optimist encouraging the receiver to do their best this school year. I'll be dropping off these kits on September 6<sup>th</sup> as I travel to visit with both the Princeton and Chillicothe clubs.

As I've traveled around the District this year, the one question that I get at almost every club meeting is "How can we attract younger members to become Optimists?" I've done a lot of thinking on this question and I think that the key is finding out what younger people in your community desire for their children and the kids in the community. Show them that by grouping together under the Optimist umbrella, possibly as a "Club within a Club" they can achieve those goals. I do know that younger people are not interested in traditional meetings, so a difference format such as the "Club within a Club" may be the answer. Again thank you for the warm hospitality that has been shown to me as I traveled around the District. I've really enjoyed serving as your District Governor and meeting all the wonderful Optimists around the state. Thank you for this opportunity to serve you.

# **Welcome New Members**





#### "Club within a Club" Frequently Asked Questions

#### Q. What is a "Club within a Club"?

A. "Club within a Club" is a group of at least 15 new Optimist Members that are added to your Club in order to expand service to your community. They are still Members of your Optimist Club, but they function somewhere outside the scope of your Club's traditional membership base and activities.

#### Q. What are some examples?

A. Examples include:

- A morning or afternoon Club that adds 15 new Members by adding an evening meeting to accommodate community Members unable to meet during the day.
- A Club with an older membership base that brings in a group of young professionals or college students to bolster membership, help with existing projects, and bring new ideas and excitement.
- A Club that recruits a group of teachers or other school personnel to work directly with the school.
- A group of Members that focuses solely on one project all year like a major town fair or childhood cancer. Think of them like an expanded committee.

The whole point of a "Club within a Club" is to get Optimist Club's to think "outside the box" in their membership recruitment and activities. There are unlimited possibilities.

#### Q. How do I form one?

A. Look for any opportunities within your community. Think of a special project that needs to be accomplished. Are there other volunteer groups working in your area that might benefit from a partnership with your Optimist Club? Consider your Club's current membership. Are there any groups in your community that you are failing to attract? Younger people? Teachers? Men? Women? The most successful Optimist Clubs have diverse memberships reflecting a cross-section of all ages, genders, professions, and backgrounds existing in their communities. Why are these groups not joining your Club? What could you do to change that? A common example is an Optimist Club that fails to attract younger Members or working people because they meet in the morning or afternoon.

#### Q. What is the cost?

A. There is no Charter fee. Clubs will be billed for the Members of the "Club within a Club" in the same manner in which they are billed for other Members. A regular, adult Member still pays the \$15.00 processing fee and full International and District dues. If they are Friends of Optimist, college Members, \$30 under 30, etc., they will be billed accordingly. Any class of Optimist Member may be included in a "Club within a Club". They will be included in your dues billing along with your other Members.

- Q. Does the "Club within a Club" have its own officers?
- A. They may have informal officers to help conduct their meetings and business. The main Club's officers and Board of Directors are still the legally responsible party.
- Q. Can they open their own bank account?
- A. Maybe. The "Club within a Club" does not have their own unique governmental filing information, which is required for nonprofits to open a bank account in most countries. You would need to ask your bank about the process of opening another account using the same governmental filing information.

Groups that wish to have their own officers and/or bank account may be better off as a new, independent Optimist Club. See below for more information.

#### Q. How does this differ from new Club building?

A. A "Club within a Club" is not fully autonomous to operate how it chooses. The main Club's Board of Directors is still legally responsible for the new group's activities and finances. This is great for groups that do not wish to worry about Club administration, officer elections, governmental filings, etc.

Many groups wish to be autonomous. If a group wants to have their own legally responsible officers, bank accounts, etc., they should probably be formed as a new Club. If you are unsure if a group should be a new Club or a "Club within a Club", please call the Membership Department at 800-500-8130 ext. 226.

# Q. My Club just had a successful membership recruitment drive and added 15 Members? Do we get credit for a Club within a Club?

A. While this is a great accomplishment, it is not a "Club within a Club" unless these 15 Members are doing something differently than your Club's traditional activities.

Q. If the "Club within a Club" eventually decides it should become its own Optimist Club, will they be able to?

A. Yes.

Q. If they do break off to form their own Club, will the original Club be hurt for awards purposes?

A. No

# Q. Once we have identified and recruited our 15 Members, how do we notify Optimist International?

A. All 15 Members must be added on the same day. You may add the Members yourself online at www.optimistleaders.org. After that, notify Optimist International that you have done so at the contact information at the bottom of this page. #### **ACH Payments for Club Dues**

Here's a great idea to save your club's Treasurer time, while reducing the effort required to pay your Optimist International and District Dues – sign up for ACH Payments today. A recent article of The Optimist magazine detailed the advantages of using the Automated Clearing House (ACH) payment system to pay your club's dues and new member fees. No need to worry about missing a payment or sending it in late. No more checks to write for dues or stamps to mail the payments. It's simple and it works well.

When you use this payment method, your Treasurer receives an email with the club's dues invoice, showing the amount due for the quarter. Then about 5 days later, the money is automatically withdrawn from the bank account your club authorized. Optimist International deposits your club dues amount in our District Bank Account and sends a report to the District Secretary-Treasurer of the payments that have been made.

To enroll in ACH Payments, simply follow these steps:

- 1. Go to www.optimist.org.
- 2. Select Member Resources.
- 3. Under Administration & Tax Information, select ACH Debit.
- 4. Complete and submit the applicable Authorization Agreement

# **Deerfield Optimists Celebrate 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary**

#### **History of Optimist Club of Deerfield Illinois**

In 1972 a group of educators, teachers, business people, and administrators from the Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC), headquartered in Deerfield Illinois, with Jim Eanes, formed the club. Jim was a current Optimist member. Other early Presidents and Leaders were Charles "Bud" Beattie of Baxter, Herb Wenger and Don Lindsley from school district 110 and Richard "Bud" Angvall, President of American Rubber & Gasket Company,

These men started the club and helped it grow over the next 25 years. As of this writing all have died. But in each obituary it is written they were a member or president of the Deerfield club.

The club was initially a breakfast club that met 7 am so working members could attend. And there was one evening meeting a month. The club started selling trees in 1978 in a small wooden shack in back of what was then the village hall. Heated by kerosene lamp. Around 1983-85 the Deerfield Park District (DPD) allowed us to use Jewett Park, where we sold trees for over 30 years. We rented trailers for the 4-5 week period. In 1989 we bought the trailer that we currently have.

For the last 15 years the DHS Wrestling team under Coach Pechter has volunteered to help unload the Christmas trees to the lot. It has become an annual event with alumni showing up to help. The tennis team also volunteers, under Coach Leighton .We couldn't hold the sale without them. A donation to DHS is made to honor these teams.

The Optimist Club and the DPD have formed a long, strong relationship over the years . Weve had Easter egg hunts sold tickets for Family days, staffed "Mudfest" volley ball, tug-o-war and pie eating contest for High Schoolers on Labor Day weekend; helped with Halloween Hoopla. In turn the DPD sets up the tree lot, runs electricity to our trailer and provides overhead lighting For 20 years we had Mr. and Mrs. Santa Clause show up. In turn the Club makes a sizable yearly donation to the DPD and its foundation.

In 1987 we welcomed our first female member, Virgina Pokorny, who became our first female President 1994-5. We have selected a teacher of the year with an award in her honor. Steve Strauss, president 1981-82, was a principal in Evanston, is credited with the extremely successful Special Essay Contest in partnership with the North Shore Special Education District (NSSED). NSSED teachers and kids get little recognition, so we decided to include their Jr High students in writing, competing and being awarded. For over 25 years we have been doing that contest. We have had as many as 350 people attend the awards dinner. As of this writing NSSED is known as "True North" and located in Northbrook.

Another project Deerfield Club did for many years was working with Camp One Step, a cancer camp on Lake Geneva. The kids attended two weeks in July from the northern suburbs and Chicago. We created a Christmas in July for them with a variety of toys and gifts. Mary Robinson and club members raised money and bought the gifts. We also had a Christmas party for cancer kids at the Embassy suites hotel. It also was a big success and very inspiring.

Covid paused tree sales for a year but in 2021 The DPD moved us across the park and with good signage, publicity and member effort we sold out the 425 trees we had ordered. Optimist Christmas trees and Deerfield go together and over the years we have given out over \$100,000 in scholarships to District 113 seniors wholly on the basis of volunteerism to the community.

The club has had as many as 100 members, with women and men equally being active and holding office. Currently we are a luncheon club with a monthly evening meeting.

Today as I write this, the Optimist Club of Deerfield, known for being "The Friend of Youth" has a vital role to play in the Community. And it is essential that the world needs Optimists.
