Notes from the Governor Designates Pen

I want to share some thoughts about the Illinois District. As I prepare to assume the role as Governor on October 1, I think it important you know something about me personally and as an Optimist. I grew up on a grain and livestock farm outside Pawnee, Illinois, the youngest of five children. My first leadership role was as President of my FFA chapter. Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIUC) is my alma mater. Prior to graduation in 1974 with a Bachelor of Science in Animal Industries, I served as president of the Block and Bridle club and competed inter-collegiately on the Livestock Judging Team. My junior year I was selected to be a Summer Agribusiness and Management trainee with Ralston Purina. Upon graduation I worked nine years for the University of Illinois as a county extension adviser in Agriculture. As an advisor I worked with the 4H program in Montgomery and Union counties. In 1983 I was approached by a bank to come to work for them as an Agricultural loan officer. This resulted in a 35 year career as a commercial loan officer. I retired in June of 2018.

Forty-five years ago I met and married Judy (44 yrs). We both were employed by the U of I at the time. Judy retired a few years ahead of me as a teacher in Family and Consumer Science (Home Ec). Judy is a graduate of Indiana State University with a degree in Vocational Home Economics, and has her Masters in Education from Lindenwood University. We have two children, a son who is a graduate of Tulane University with a Masters in Architecture, and a daughter who graduated from Washington University as a Doctor of Physical Therapy. We have two grandchildren, a grandson (7) and granddaughter, 22 months. I offer this brief personal history, not to be braggadocios, but to help you understand who I am and how my life has been formed. We each bring a history to the Illinois District, and I believe by learning these histories we develop strength through Understanding.

Relevant a word you will hear a lot from me this year. I firmly believe clubs must be and must be seen as relevant in their respective communities. But equally important, the district must be seen as relevant to the clubs which comprise the district. I desire to improve the district's perception among clubs. A question that continues to go through my mind is "how" we make the district more relevant to its clubs and members. Cousins Coding Program Advances STEM Training And Coding In Morgan Park, Launches Expanded Program At South Shore Cultural Center

In a building on 111th Street in Chicago's Morgan Park community that has been owned by the same family for three generations, more than two dozen young people ranging in age from 5 to 15 are learning 21st century skills and strategies to prepare them for their futures in a digital world. Cousins Coding, the Chicago branch of Optimist international, a national non-profit organization that has been in operation more than one hundred years.

These intellectually curious youth, called CEO Superstars, are being trained in STEM subjects and coding by an illustrious group of community experts including Ph.D's, martial artists and engineers, to prepare them for the jobs and positions in a digital future. The program is already a huge success in Morgan Park and the group will be launching a branch of the program in the fall at the South Shore Country Club.

Cousins Empowered Optimist Club of Chicago (CEO), headed by Raimonda Pierce, transported 33 youth and their families to Wakandacon, at the Hyatt Regency McCormick Place in downtown Chicago on Saturday July 27th at 10:30 am. They hosted a Black Panther Themed Costume Contest, awarding \$100.00 to the first place winner. (\$50.00 & \$25.00 to second & third place winners). The youth, called CEO Superheroes, presented a rap created for them by mentor & musician Trey Station to help them learn the language of coding.

A team of volunteers provides & self-finances this year round STEAM & life skill development strategy based in Morgan Park in the former home of Safari. CEO is now collaborating with the Jackson Park Golf Association headed by Tracy Raoul, to bring the program to the South Shore Cultural Center.

They are creating a documentary entitled Collaboration, with the goal of inspiring enhanced STEAM & life skill development strategies. The team creating this film is headed by director/filmmaker Cydia Flowers, which includes filmmaker Delacy Peters & photographers J'Nae Antoinette, Pierre Clark & David Jenkins. Photographer Preston Thomas captured the Superheroes at Wakandacon.

Their lead mentor is Professor Anthony Jackson, who has earned 2 degrees in Physics and a degree in computer science. He is supported by engineer, entrepreneur, martial arts educator & Vice President of CEO Donta Rice & mentor Asheton Farrow. Gachele Coffey serves as media coach & mental health specialist. Dionne Victoria teaches STEAM through art. Master photographer David Jenkins oversees the implementation of 3 levels of photography skill development.

Their advisory board includes Deborah Farrow, who is an educator with 30 years of experience, entrepreneur/educator & CEO administrator Chaka Farrow & educator Cherie Noisette, who assesses our Superheroes and coordinates academic reinforcement strategies.

Yvonne Orr-El & Pierre Clark oversee resource development and serve on the advisory board, as do educator Alexis Wallace, educator/entrepreneurs Serene Bridgett & Kalana Cale, former attorney now spiritual coach Beth Herndobler, entrepreneur/nurse administrator Cherokee Lewis, entrepreneur/esthetician Jocelyn Rials, educator Theresa Delsoin, entrepreneur/artist Chester Allen, Bishop Dr. Sabree (Cheryl) Myhand, entrepreneur/artist Kellie McCann, author/entertainer/motivator Michael Colyar, entrepreneur/martial arts educator Azziza Muhammad, and strategist Anna Station. Ruth & John Del Re & Terry Wright serve as mentors in the hundred year old organization -- Optimist International.
