





### Optimist Club of Deerfield Service Recognition Award

The **Optimist Club of Deerfield** held its' first annual Service Recognition Award program this past May. This program recognizes students in the high school for their outstanding service to their school and community.

In December, an email was sent to all the teachers and staff at our local Deerfield High School announcing the new program. In January, as everyone came back from winter break, we launched the program.

All teachers and staff were asked to participate and to recommend a student that met the service criteria determined by the committee. 20 students were nominated. An application form was then sent to each student, but the nominator remained anonymous. 16 students chose to participate. After the applications were received by the Club, each nominee was interviewed by two Optimist Club members and the winners were chosen, with a maximum of three in each class (Freshman, Sophomore, Junior and Senior). In all, there were 3 winners each in the Junior and Senior classes, two in the Sophomore class and one in the Freshman class.

The Club was literally "blown away" by the achievements of these remarkable young people. Some examples are:

- A student who developed her own blog on internet security after hearing about a district breach which resulted in identity theft. She has since started working with our Village and local schools doing presentations and education about identity theft.
- A student who created a "socktopi" stuffed animal to donate to organizations so that they can sell them for fundraising
- Students who raised tens of thousands of dollars for the high school School Chest, an annual fundraiser
- Students who work with underserved and special needs children
- A student who created a non-profit organization to raise money in honor of a friend diagnosed with cancer
- A student who created a DJ company and donates his services complimentary to non-profit organizations for their fundraisers



A reception was held in a local restaurant for the winners, and our attendees included members of the Club, the mayor, the school principal, and the Forest Preserve District president.

Each student received a \$100 award.

Being involved in the community means more than actively volunteering for projects in Lewistown for Becky Humphrey. It is essential to success.

"My father told me, You must be involved in the community to succeed at your business," Humphrey said. And she has followed that advice steadfastly.

lowed that advice steadfastly. Humphrey has lived in Liverpool for 35 years. Perhaps unsurprisingly, spending many years as Village President.

The depth of her involvement in Lewistown may be greater than many realize, however.

Humphrey has been President of the Lewistown Chamber of Commerce for nearly 15 years, and she's been very actively involved as a member of the Lewistown Optimist Club for just about as long.

Civic groups are often eager to add new members to their rolls. Club officers hope new faces will provide fresh leadership as well; someone else can take a turn presiding over meetings, chairing project committees and holding other positions of responsibility.

When Humphrey moved into the Lewistown business community, it didn't take long for that sort of scenario to unfold. If she ever felt like a stranger there, the thought soon perished.

She and her father opened CAR Financial Inc., a tax preparation and insurance business, in December 2002 at 195 West Euclid Street. To show her support for the community, Humphrey attended a Lewistown Chamber of Commerce meeting in January 2003. Before that meeting was over, Humphrey had become Vice President of the Chamber. And they knew they had chosen well. Six months later she was President – and she's been President ever since.

Humphrey's also been with the Lewistown Optimist Club since 2003 or 2004. She plays a key role with that group, too.

"I just turned 60, and I'm the youngest in the group," Humphrey said. She added she'd like to see younger people get involved with the Optimists.

#### **Community service**

The Lewistown Optimist Club and Lewistown Chamber of Commerce do countless projects for children, families and businesses with the support of the community.

The Optimists conduct the annual Easter Egg Hunt for more than 200 children, stuffing 3,000 to 4,000 eggs with candy, prizes and money.

They also host Fright Night at the elementary school to provide a safe environment for children to trick-or-treat. Businesses sponsor various doors and hand out treats.

To provide gifts for needy children at Christmas, they place Tag Trees at the Fulton County Courthouse, the two local Casey's stores and all the local banks. Members of the public are encouraged to pick a tag off a tree and purchase a gift for the child indicated.

A lot of preparation goes into this. To raise fund the Optimists hold an auction the first week of April and man a lemonade stand at the Fulton County Fair. In early November, the Tag Trees cam-

paign is advertised in the news-

paper. "Theresa and I fill out 125 to 200 tags, laminate them and distribute them" where the Tag Trees are set up, Humphrey said.

When it's time to pick up the gifts purchased, they are taken to Humphrey's business to prepare for distribution. It's a busy scene at the office.

"It looks like something exploded in here," Humphrey said.

In addition, the Optimist Club fills all the tags not taken. "We spend three to five hours shopping" for all those tags, she said.

"But without the community support, there wouldn't be any Tag Trees. So we're very grateful," Humphrey said.

She said they gave gifts to 157 kids last year.

"We also donate to the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts," Humphrey said.

In addition, the Optimists sponsor an essay contest for scholarships. Those who go on to win at the state level win more scholarships. Locally, the essays are assigned by English teacher Susan Lalary to students in her honors class.

The Optimists also sponsor the float for Santa Claus in the annual Lighted Christmas Parade, the decorated float contest for the parade and treats after it in the Presbyterian Church. "You get to decorate a cookie and sit on Santa's lap," Humphrey said.

The Lewistown Chamber sponsors the parade itself. They've tried to organize a Tour of Homes the last couple of years, but to no avail, Humphrey said.

For some reason homeowners have resisted letting visitors tromp through their houses in the middle of winter, she laughed.

The MAPPING Committee sponsors activities at the Visitors Center the day of the parade, Humphrey added.

#### The Chamber

The Chamber sponsors the Little Mr. Firecracker and Ms. Sparkler Contest, fireworks, music and other activities for the Fulton County Independence Day Celebration, along with numerous other events throughout the year.

The Chamber is best known for welcoming new businesses, supporting existing businesses and promoting the local economy.

my. "The Chamber does ribbon cuttings for new businesses in town as an honorary thing, and invites businesses to join the Chamber, which in turn gives them free advertisement. People go to the web and look us up, so it's advantageous to be in the Chamber," Humphrey said.

She added ribbon cuttings are conducted for new members of the Chamber as well.

Humphrey said her office has received calls from people asking whether some business even exists. Others request more information about local businesses, and they provide it.

It all seems about treating others the way they wish to be treated.

"I support the community, and I just hope the community will support us," Humphrey said.

#### Background

Before starting the business in Lewistown with her dad, Humphrey worked for State Farm Insurance agent Gene Zook and other agencies from 1993 to 2000. Her father, the late Charles Arnold Alexander, owned C.A.R. Financial in Pekin. He specialized in tax preparation. They talked about joining forces. Her clients were in

forces. Her clients were in Lewistown. He maintained an office in Pekin but moved the headquarters to Lewistown. It was cheaper to buy than rent, so they purchased the building on West Euclid, she said.

"Heck, we bought the building on a gentleman's handshake," Humphrey recalled.

Theress Strode joined the business in March 2003 and soon after became a partner. She provides payroll and other financial services. In fact, she overlaps with Humphrey in most of the work now. Later, Sheldon Burget joined and became a partner. He

#### Changes

Humphrey's father died in 2015. The business moved December 15, 2016 to its present location at 144 West 12th, behind the Casey's North store. Another change is still being being implemented – a new name for the business.

Humphrey said she and Strode and Burget have formed a new corporation called Cani2Co. They still say "C.A.R. Financial" when answering the phone, but the old company will be retired in November. They'll transition to the new name after the tax season, Humphrey said.

The characters in the name "Cani2.Co" stand for "computers and consulting, accounting and audits, numbers and network, insurance and internet – to the power of 2 – Company," Humphrey said.

#### Highland Honors Police, Firefighters, and EMTs

On May 17, the **Highland Optimist**, Moose, and Rotary clubs held their annual Respect for Law Banquet, where special members of local law enforcement are honored for their service to the community.

This year, three outstanding law professionals received awards from three categories, the David McCain Memorial Officer of the Year, the Optimist Officer of the Year, and the Moose Lodge Telecommunicator of the Year. The evening included a short awards ceremony and steak fry. Highland Police Department Chief **Terry Bell**, Highland Optimist president **David Callahan**, and Moose Lodge member **Dave Wirz** presented the awards.

Highland Police Department **Chris Flake** was given the David McCain Memorial Officer of the Year award for the second time. Flake has been with the police department for 8 years. In April of 2014, Flake became an investigator and has been assigned as the lead detective in countless felony cases. Flake plays a large part in all major cases and can always be counted on to complete his task with professionalism and dedication, says Chief Bell.

**David Callahan** presented patrolman **David Brines** with the Optimist Officer of the Year award. Brines has been with the police department since March 2008. Callahan said that Brines in known throughout Highland as a knowledgeable senior office, who helps guide unsure officers through incidents. Brines handled 945 incidents in 2016 and was one of the leading officers in arrests and citations.

"He has consistently been one of the top performers among all of the officers," Callahan said.
