#### A Letter From Bill Wagner

#### **Governor Elect and Membership Chair**

Hello Fellow Optimist!

First let me introduce myself. I am at Governor Sandi's request and my consent the District Chair for Membership for the 2018-2019 Optimist year. I have also been elected to be Your Governor Elect for 2018-2019 year. So I am in training to be Your Governor for 2019-2020.

I will try to keep this relatively short. Why the numbers you ask? Well here are the answers.

1358 = Number of members in district as of 10/1/2018. This is our starting point.

86 = Number of new members / names added to club rosters in 2017-2018

33% = Clubs that did not add a new name to their club roster

17% = Clubs who added 5 or more names to their roster in2017-2018

9% = Net % growth to date of new members thru 10/24/2018. This assumes a goal of 100 new members in this Optimist year.

I would hope each of you would reflect upon the following questions. I believe they have a bearing on the above information, and membership.

Why should someone join your club? What makes your club relevant to the community it serves? In what areas could your club improve? Why do people not join an Optimist Club?

"Too busy is not a good reason"

I encourage each of you reading this newsletter to take these questions seriously and discuss them with your membership. Each club officer will be receiving from me a letter within the next two week seeking your club's goal for membership growth and their Plan of Accomplishment for this Optimist year.

In the meantime, have you thought about asking a teacher or a past member to consider joining or rejoining? They can do so for a dues payment of \$30.00 (plus \$11.00 Illinois Optimist dues). Anyone have a college student? They can be a member at the collegiate rate. Do you have supporters of your club that might be considered a Friend of Optimist? They could be included for \$100 and part of the dues is reimbursed back to your club. These are ways to increase membership.

My goal for membership in 2018-2019 is twofold. 1: Net growth in membership by more than 100. (42\*3=126) 2: Eliminate the 33% figure from the list above.

Members these goals are attainable. So let's not be Pessimists but instead be OPTIMISTS! Work with your club membership to develop a strategic plan to accomplish your club's growth!





Optimist International President Rebecca Butler Mona stopped in Silvis on October 4 for the first Presidential Centennial Event of the year! The eight Quad City Optimist Clubs (Milan, Moline, and Silvis, Ill.; Bettendorf, Davenport Noon, North Scott, Quad-City Morning, and River Valley, Iowa) gathered to celebrate.





Governor Sandi Schmidt hosted, with presentations from President Mona as well as BSA Troop 383, Friendly House, Jefferson School, and YouthHope – all organizations that have benefited from the work of our clubs. Mayor Matt Carter declared October 4 to be "Optimist International Celebration Day" in Silvis.



This was an inspiring evening that will keep our members energized as we begin the new year!

#### We Are In The Driver's Seat

Helping kids, in all regards, that's what it's all about. the Foundation is the vehicle and we're the drivers. How far can we go? That depends the amount of gas. There are 11 different ways to contribute to the Foundation and make a difference in kid's lives as Optimists.

Where does the money go you ask? Here are ten things accomplished in 2017:

1) Sent 136 students off to college with Optimist International oratorical, essay and CCDHH scholarships totaling \$315,800.

2) Relaunched and broadened the CCC Matching Grant program to include health and wellness projects that relate to Childhood Cancer.

3) Helped 352 Optimists help 7,027 children and their families by awarding 22 Club Grants including 2 grants to clubs in Africa.

4) Assisted Clubs in receiving \$303,158 in charitable contributions for their own local programs through the Pass Through program.

5) Supported the Optimist International Oratorical World Championship Contest by funding the US and International winners totaling \$35,000.

6) Contributed \$35,540 towards the Optimist International Research Fellowship in Pediatric Hematology and Oncology at Johns Hopkins.

7) Paid out \$384,052 to clubs utilizing the Club Campaign program and added an additional \$21,421 in interest to Club Campaigns funds.

8) Ended the year with 204 Members to the Women's Philanthropy Council, which will fund two scholarships and two Club grants in 2018.


9) Launched initiative to provide \$100 grants to new JOI Clubs with 25 members or more to help conduct service projects.

10)Increased unrestricted giving over the previous year by 15%.

I am looking forward to working with each club to facilitate the future accomplishments I know we can achieve together as a district. At the end of the day there is no more satisfying feeling than knowing you have had a direct impact on the lives of others who may never know your name.

#### When Optimists Come Together

The Sterling and Rock Falls Optimist Clubs got together and sponsored students from the Two Cities to attend a Junior Historian Program offered by the Sterling-Rock Historical Society.

This was their second year of sponsorship, a total of 37 students in two years. Way to go Sterling and Rock Falls Optimists!

#### Sterling-Rock Falls Historical Society - Junior Historians, 2018

A team of six retired teachers have completed one week of a Junior Historians Camp through the Sterling-Rock Falls Historical Society and in partnership with the Sterling and Rock Falls Optimists Clubs. Our theme for the entire week was "Illinois' Bicentennial." Twenty-two students participated in the week's activities in our new Lincoln Learning Center next door to our historical Lincoln-Manahan Home. We met from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM each day during the week of July 9-13. The timeline provided by the Illinois Bicentennial Commission was used to develop our curriculum. Students learned about the early settling of Illinois and what transportation was used in its growth. The routes of the Cumberland Road, Lincoln Highway, and Route 66 were mapped. A guest speaker presented information and samples of prairie vegetation. We observed the growth of the Monarch butterfly in its pupae and chrysalis stages. Agriculture, industry, and natural resources were studied, in addition to learning about the accomplishments of various individuals over the course of 200 years. Crafts included cornhusk dolls, sachets, tic-tac-toe games made from burlap, and Bicentennialthemed rock paintings to be placed around the twin communities. Students made pumpkin " ie" and ate melon in conjunction with studying the various state symbols and products of Illinois. They made their own "Illinois history books" to commemorate important aspects of Illinois history.

A program was presented to families and the public on the last afternoon. Students received Illinois passport books, Bicentennial pins, and maps of Illinois. They performed a square dance to the tune of "Going Down to Cairo" and sang the state song "Illinois" along with popular folk tunes from over the last two centuries. Students recited poetry by Carl Sandburg and Gwendolyn Brooks. The program ended with refreshments of Illinois-shaped cookies decorated by the students, melon, and pumpkin bread being served.

Each lesson and activity of every day was designed to recognize some aspect of Illinois' rich history. Several photos have recorded those activities, if you should be interested in them. We printed class photos and presented the students with a photo collage as a memento of the program.
